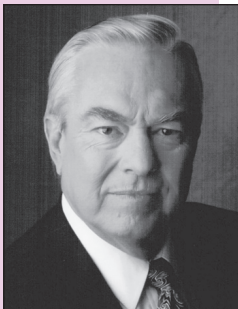

Bill Kurtis has looked at his life as a series of opportunities since he first traded in his law degree for a chance to come to Chicago as a television reporter over 40 years ago. Since then, he has written books, had his photographs professionally exhibited, become a spokesperson for the environment through his work on several not-for-profit boards, made a splash with his cameo

appearances in films and commercials and, most recently, purchased a ranch in his home state of Kansas, where he has restored the prairie and introduced a line of grass-fed cattle under the "Tallgrass" label.

National Geographic writer, photographer and biologist Jeremy Schmidt has taken his readers to the world's most breathtaking places, from Yellowstone and the Grand Tetons to Central Asia's Sayan Mountains, where he went on assignment to search for the last reindeer nomads. An adventure traveler on six continents, Schmidt has lived with eagle hunters and shamans,

been a park ranger and winter keeper. His award-winning *Himalayan Passage* describes a nine-month journey by bicycle, truck and on foot across Tibet, Mongolia, India, Nepal and Pakistan with his wife and two friends. "This was not some hard-guy solo adventure," Schmidt notes. "The women were totally capable."

Claire Copping Cross

GRAND HOUSES & GARDENS
OF ENGLAND & IRELAND
January 20, 2011



Art historian and veteran traveler Claire Copping Cross offers a glimpse into the lives lived in the "great and good places" of England and Ireland. She begins at Ham House near London—its 17th century furnishings intact, its formal gardens restored—and ends in Wicklow County, Ireland at the majestic Powerscourt estate, originally a 13th century castle. Between are Malmesbury Abbey in Wiltshire, expanded and

lovingly tended by the Pollards, known as the "naked gardeners;" Sissinghurst, resurrected from a broken-down manor house, with gardens created by that wild lady of letters, Vita Sackville West; and Glin Castle on the banks of the River Shannon.

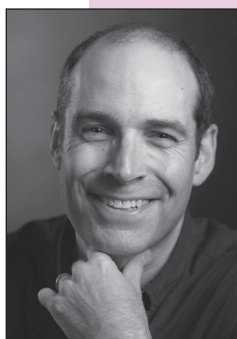

THE NEW BOAT TOUR

WTTW producer and program host Geoffrey Baer takes you on a virtual tour of the Chicago River—from the famous downtown district to seldom seen stretches north and south of the city. The river offers a view unseen anywhere else. It's an excellent vantage point from which to appreciate the fascinating mix of soaring contemporary skyscrapers and majestic neoclassical buildings, and visit historic river-edge neighborhoods like

Bridgeport, Pilsen, Chinatown, Lincoln Park and Ravenswood Manor. Beyond architecture, Baer brings in the river's colorful history, including the amazing transformation of industrial areas, guiding us through the hidden places that were once known as "Mud Lake," "Bubbly Creek" and "Little Hell."
